

**Press brief announcing Copenhagen Co-existence Lab
& the launch of The Co-existence Expedition**

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A new agenda for global co-existence

On 5-6 September 2006 the Co-existence Expedition begins its journey around the world. The international summit Copenhagen Lab of Co-existence marks the launch of the Expedition, which to 2008 will visit several countries and international institutions to set a new agenda for global co-existence and address the challenges to be met in the mission of creating and strengthening global co-existence.

“Please identify and rank the five main challenges for global co-existence”. This is the complicated, yet necessary, main task that meets eighty international key figures as they participate in the event **Copenhagen Lab of Co-existence**, which takes place 5-6 September 2006 at the IT University of Copenhagen, Denmark.

More than thirty nationalities will be represented at the Lab. Among the participants, who have been selected according to their expertise in processes supporting co-existence across different sectors and communities, are *Professor John Keane (UK)*, *Editor Hardev Kaur, New Straits Times (Malaysia)*, *High Commissioner Nuri Albala, UNHCR (France)*, *Presenter Stephen Cole, al-Jazeera International (UK)*, and *Director David Celdran, ABS-CBN News (Philippines)*.

The Copenhagen Co-existence Lab both marks the end of the Danish co-existence process that was started in the aftermath of the Cartoon Conflict and the beginning of an international process to be carried out by the **Co-existence Expedition**.

HRH Prince Hassan of Jordan has accepted to become Patron of the Co-existence Expedition, which also includes the participation of a selected number of international institutions and organisations like **Asia-Europe Foundation, Nordic Council, Strategic Foresight Group** and **Al Ahram Foundation** in Egypt. The partners will welcome the Expedition and contribute to its journey around the world.

The Co-existence process is initiated by the Danish **Monday Morning Weekly** and the Editor-in-Chief Erik Rasmussen with the aim of emphasizing the important role of media in contributing to the process of protecting and strengthening global co-existence.

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Why co-existence on the agenda

The following statements have been issued by some of the participants ahead of the Copenhagen Lab of Co-existence. The statements are answers to questions like “*What impact do you expect the Co-existence initiative to have on the global ‘co-existence agenda?’*” and “*What do you regard as being one of the main challenges for creating, maintaining and strengthening co-existence in today’s global society?’*”

“I see an important challenge for strengthening co-existence in the global society as being our ability to have a broader concept of what it means to ‘understand’ someone who is different from us. ‘Understanding’ should go beyond knowledge, and even beyond mutual respect, and into the areas of being able to feel their concerns and bitterness.”

“Participants and leaders including political leaders must look to and emphasize the similarities that exist between us – even if we are of different faiths, religions, colour and creed – and not highlight the differences. There are many important and critical similarities and these must be at the top of the agenda for all for co-existence.”

“The challenges are the context in which we work! While initiatives like this are about outreach, engaging, including, and understanding, our context is that we are functioning in a world political order that is in significant ways a war between Islam and ‘the West’ or the rest. The real challenge is that our initiatives are considerably hampered by the other reality that faces us.”
